Former FSU biology head recognized

Melvin Brown presented with **Environmental Education Award**

FROSTBURG -- Over the past 53 years, Melvin Brown has watched as the saplings of Kitzmiller Botanical Garden and Arboretum matured into towering trees and his former students blossomed into stewards of the environment.

He told those gathered at the Appalachian Laboratory recently that he remembered audience member Barbara Johnson from her student days at Beall High School when he was head of the science department, and that he remembered her husband, Richard Johnson, as an outstanding doctor and naturalist.

So when Laboratory Director Louis F. Pitelka presented Brown with the 2003 Richard A. Johnson **Environmental** Education Award, Brown said he was honored to have received the award established in memory of Dr. Johnson.

The award recognizes local citizens for their outstanding contributions to environmental education and is presented by the Appalachian Laboratory. The lab is a part of the University of Maryland Center for Environmental Science, the state's premier environmental

research institute and one of 13 institutions within

University System of Maryland.
As one of the region's leading experts on local flora, Brown has written several scholarly books on the woody and herbaceous plants of Maryland. The publications have not only received academic acclaim but serve as the leading field guides to plants in this region used by conservationists, teachers and environmental enthusiasts, said ceremony speaker, Wayne Bell, director of Washington College's Center for Environment and Society.

But while scientists recognize Brown for his outstanding contributions to the field of science, Bell said, environmental educators honor Brown for his work in communities of western Maryland, particularly his efforts in creating Kitzmiller Arboretum Botanical Garden.

"They made a place where there was only once a dream," Bell told the audience of 90 people gathered for the ceremony.

As a new science teacher at Kitzmiller High School in 1945, Brown taught students about the important role of plants in the environment by making use of an eight-acre lot surrounding the school. Students used the

arboretum they created to examine local plant species and to introduce new varieties through structured gardens. By bringing students in direct contact with their environment over a seven-year period, his efforts helped pioneer habitat restoration methods, marrying ation v __en « mental

and botanical education for both the school and residents of Kitzmiller and surrounding communities.

Even after the Kitzmiller High School closed and Brown moved onto Beall High School and then Frostburg State University, he continued to sup-port local arboretums, helping

create the Larenim Arboretum in Burlington, W.Va., and the James Madison Arboretum in Virginia. He also regularly contributes flora species to the Core Arboretum of West Virginia University. In
